Going to college is becoming an increasingly expensive endeavor. In order to make the experience more financially accessible, there are a variety of funding sources offered by the state government, federal government, and other entities. The table below highlights key information about different funding sources available to Tennessee students.

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Descriptions of Financial Aid Sources

The **Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA)** is an application that students can fill out for free to access the federal student aid (e.g. federal grants, work-study, and loans) for which they qualify.¹

The **TN HOPE Scholarship** is a scholarship and grant assistance program designed to help Tennessee residents attending eligible postsecondary institutions in Tennessee partake in post-secondary education opportunities.¹⁰

TN Promise is a scholarship and mentoring program that provides two years of tuition-free attendance at a community or technical college in Tennessee. TN Promise is a last-dollar scholarship, which means that it will cover tuition and fees not covered by other sources of financial aid such as the Pell grant, the HOPE scholarship, or the Tennessee Student Assistance Award.³

Pell Grants are form of federal financial aid which do not have to be repaid with the exception of a few circumstances. To access Pell Grants, students must complete the FAFSA.⁵

The **Tennessee STEP UP Scholarship** is for Tennessee residents with intellectual disabilities who take part in an inclusive higher education program (sometimes referred to as a Comprehensive Transition Program).⁶

The **Tennessee Vocational Rehabilitation Department** offers \$2,400 each semester in Transitional Learning Services funds for two academic years.⁷

Federal Work Study is a student aid program that provides part-time employment for students enrolled in postsecondary education to help pay for their education.⁸

The **Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant** “is a grant for undergraduate students with exceptional financial need.” It is directly administered by the financial aid office at each school participating in the program.⁹
